Accordingly, Camp Zion's income from camper fees is down by nearly \$120,000 over last year. We have cut expenses, but still have ongoing operational expenses and staff salaries.

Architectural and legal fees related to our new Dining Hall have been substantial. When we are granted the permit for the new dining hall, Millenium Construction will be ready to hit the ground running, and we want to be sure to have the necessary funds already in hand.

A number of years ago, the Camp Leadership Team wisely increased the emergency reserve fund. That fund has carried us thus far through this challenging time, and now needs to be replenished.

Camp Files Suit In Federal Court

(from original press release) On March 9, we filed for a Conditional Use Permit and variance request for the new Dining Hall & Fellowship Center. On July 7, after a 5-hour hearing, the Board of Adjustment rejected our plans for the second time in 5 years.

On August 14, we filed a complaint asking a federal court to decide where we may locate the new building to replace our 35-year old, obsolete facility.

"We planned the building in the exact area the County designated for institutional use," said Camp Director Dale Stewart. "We located it exactly where County staff agreed is the best site, and designed a short, elevated walkway, ideal for special needs children and the elderly and meets Americans with Disabilities Act requirements."

"It was disheartening to see Board members speculate about multiple possible sites far away in woodland areas that would burden the camp and our guests, destroy hundreds of the beautiful trees we love so much, and force the building to stand out rather than blend in with the Northwoods setting that makes this place so special."

In its decision, the Board said locating elsewhere was not an unnecessary burden or hardship because the disabled could be transported in vehicles.

"They really don't understand," Stewart said. "A huge part of camp is just being together. We've seen it many times over the years spontaneous conversations on the way to meals and events open hearts and minds and spark lifelong decisions and friendships. The goal of ADA and Camp Zion is to give everyone the same access to those experiences, not isolating some people with repeated rides in a van to a separate entrance."

"Forcing the elderly and special needs campers to ride in vehicles would create more traffic, not less. And buying a properly equipped van, then training and paying staff to transport them could easily cost 20% of our annual budget, not to mention the disruption to scheduling and hardship on the guests themselves."

"We keep fees as low as possible so that children from all families can attend," Stewart explained. "Our donors sacrifice to make up the difference. Those funds should be helping children."

In 2015, we applied for permission to build the new facility on the shorefront parcel. The Town of Liberty Grove Board approved the plans and the Door County Resource Planning Committee granted a permit to build. However, several area residents appealed to the Board, which overturned the Committee's decision.

Rather than challenge the Board's decision in court, we spent the last 5 years and an additional \$300,000 responding to their concerns. Besides the usual impact studies and management plans, we again purchased more land, conferred with County officials and neighbors, retained leading design and engineering firms, designed a lowvisibility structure on a site designated for institutional use, reviewed the site with County zoning staff, and chip-sealed both the road by camp, and a new access drive we built for neighbors in 2008.

When the Board rejected our plans yet again, Camp leadership determined that a judgment and resolution by the courts is the only alternative to yet more delay, expense, and uncertainty.

"We've already been damaged by years of delay, enormous development costs, and attorneys' fees. We simply can't afford five more years and hundreds of thousands more dollars trying to guess where the Board might allow us to build, and if they will abide by its own zoning ordinance."

"We desperately need modern facilities that accommodate all campers together," Stewart said. "Mealtimes and other group activities are as essential to the Camp Zion family as they are to any other family. Now more than ever, young people and our other guests need to unplug from their media and connect with themselves, their family and friends, and their savior, Jesus Christ."

"Camp Zion strives to be a good neighbor and has broad support among area residents and businesses," Stewart said. "Camp is a positive force that makes significant contributions to the community and local economy. We've been here almost 75 years and, God willing, will be here another 75 years, building lives and relationships and proclaiming the life-changing power of new life in Christ."

Dining Hall Update

Work continues on dining hall plans with our partners from Fletemeyer & Lee Architects, Baudhuin Surveying & Engineering, Kitchen Consultants, and Millenium Construction. Depending on the progress of the litigation with the County, we hope to break ground sometime in 2021.

Unfortunately, construction costs have risen dramatically due to the long delays in getting the project started, and COVID-related supplychain issues. Generous friends like you have donated a majority of the building funds, but **the project is not yet fully funded**. Additionally, we need funds to cover costs associated with:

- Wastewater treatment system
- Kitchen equipment (\$225,000 est., going up 6% in 2021)
- Dining room tables & chairs
- Meeting room furniture
- AV equipment
- Landscaping
- Related legal fees

Camp Zion Giving Options

Camp Zion Advance. Our general giving fund.

Scholarships. Donors contribute \$60,000 per year to keep camper costs down and assist those in need.

New Dining Hall & Fellowship Center.

75 Years Of God's Faithfulness

Youth and camp ministries were few and far between in 1945. However, early camp leaders Paul "Pete" Peters, Steve LaBelle, Frank Scaccia, and others from Christ Community Church in Zion, Illinois, had been doing youth ministry and youth camping trips since the late 1930s.

These men were quietly working on plans to turn their vision of starting a Christian camp into reality. Though they did not yet have the official blessing of church leaders, they began scouting out sites across Wisconsin where it might be possible to build a camp. They heard about Door County, and scheduled a trip to check it out.

In early 1946, the men asked the owner of the Beard Farm if they could hold camp on his property (about a mile south of our current site on Door Bluff Road). In exchange for picking his cherries, he agreed to let them have the first "Zion Camp" that summer.

Plans are well underway for our 75th season, and we can't wait for 2021! God has given us the great privilege of ministering to thousands of campers of all ages over the past 75 years, and we have seen many lives changed by the Gospel. We are excited to see what He has in store during the next 75 years!
